Notes:

- The basins shown are those used by the Australian Water Resources Council. The locality plans show the location of each basin; Map 1 shows how the basins fit together at a larger scale. The streams shown are generally 3rd order and larger (see chapter 9).
- Values are drawn from various sources:
 - the high scenic value landscapes were identified in a study carried out by the Department of Conservation, Forests and Lands (see chapter 17);
 - the high naturalness catchments were identified in regional studies using L. Macmillan's approach; other values (botanical, geomorphic) are from sites of significance studies or papers;
 - native fish diversity and rarity are from the Department of Water Resources' Natural Resources Inventory (see chapter 15);
 - high canoeing value streams are those reaches with white-water rapids graded 2 or higher in the Victorian Amateur Canoe Association touring guide; high camping value streams are those reaches, away from structured campgrounds, which are popular for car based camping, from various sources; high recreational fishing value streams, for both exotic and native fish, are those identified by Tunbridge and Glenside; sites of waterfalls are from various sources (see chapter 16).
